

MINUTES OF THE WIRT COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION

July 28, 2009

The Wirt County Board of Education met in their regular meeting on Tuesday, July 28, 2009 in the Wirt County High School cafeteria. Present were James Rader, President, Sheila Dye, Vice President, Jerry Ash, Mark Lowe, and Chuck Mills, members, Daniel Metz, Superintendent, and Karen Cummings, Treasurer.

Mr. Rader called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. On a motion by Mrs. Dye, seconded by Mr. Ash, the minutes of the previous meeting held on July 14, 2009, were approved.
